

CIVIL WAR CANNON ON DISPLAY at the HISTORIC ASSEMBLY BUILDING



WHY IS IT PAINTED RED? By Michael Nelson, Trustee, HSTI

As you are approaching the steps up to the front door of the Missiles & More Museum, your eyes will be drawn to an exciting new display relating to action on Topsail Island that occurred during the Civil War. What you are looking at is an authentic Civil War era "6 pounder" cannon. The gun is graciously on loan to our Museum from the Brunswick Town/ Fort Anderson State Historic Site down in Brunswick County. The foundry stamp on the starboard trunnion dated 1851 and the stamp on the top of the barrel shows that it was made for the Arkansas Military Institute (AKI). Arkansas was a slave holding state and a bona fide member of the Confederacy. The AKI was modeled after West Point Academy and many of its instructors and leadership had West Point backgrounds. Most of the AKI cadets served as officers in the Confederate army, mostly under Hood's Division, Longstreet's Corps, of Lee's Army of Northern

Virginia. Very few of them ever returned to Arkansas.

The Barrel alone is 50" long, made of solid brass and weights an incredible 680 pounds. Brunswick Town did not have a carriage for the barrel but did supply me with a very detailed set of plans for building a 18th Century Naval Artillery Carriage for the gun. I rescaled the carriage from the plans to fit the specific dimensions of this barrel and built it out of many layers of pressure treated 1'x 8 lumber that was laminated together under a lot of pressure from clamps. The naval carriage weighs close to 200 pounds itself.

So why did we paint it RED. Most of the cannons you see in movies and on display in museums were signal guns or ceremonial guns. Their carriages were stained in deep wood tones and finished with many coats of varnish. Since we were going to display this cannon out front in our harsh coastal environment and in direct sun light, I knew it would have to be painted with the best exterior ename! I could find. My original plan was to paint it in a blue gray color to complement the building. However, I discovered that while guns on the Admiral's ships were fancy and polished; the guns on the true "Ships of the Line" that were engaged in mortal combat were almost universally painted in a deep dark red. Not only did they paint the guns carriages red but also the decks, ceiling, and walls of the gun decks. This was done to mitigate the trauma the sailors operating the guns were facing with all the blood, guts and carnage occurring around them during battle. So, as you look at this exciting new display please keep in mind not only the glory days of sail in our Naval history, but the tremendous courage, dedication and sacrifice of our ancestors who served our great county.


